<i>Adjectives for first cause/effect</i>	first, initial
<i>Adjectives for subsequent cause/effect</i>	additional, another, next, second, still another
<i>Adjectives for third cause/effect</i>	final, last (These are used only with the last main point or sub-point.)
<i>Adverbs for subsequent argument/sub-point</i>	additionally, furthermore, in addition, moreover
<i>Adverbs for third cause/effect</i>	finally, lastly (These are used only with the last main point or sub- point.)
